





Theme: Migration/Globalisation

Accommodation/Food/Travel

Both groups shared rooms but seperate for men/women Every group in different hostel: private time in evening

Food during weekend – Self Pay: Sushi – self cooking (liver)

Lunch on campus (hot meal): highly appreciated and necessary, - You always eat bread...

Travel: 1-2 days relax time after travel: OK!

Visa: formal invitation for Uganda group – check from Embassy



Group dynamics

Students Uganda: some anxiety beforehand about possible discrimination, but actually felt welcome and accepted by everyone

Cultural evening: traditional dancing!

- Belgian buddies Unequal budget: weekend trip London – cycling in Bruges -Attention to create a safe space, everyone feels comfortable being themselves Online preparation: very hesitant to share personal information Tight-knit group and lasting friendships and partnerships



Intercultural Learning - Evaluation: different attitude Uganda-USA

USA students: roots in Puerto Rico – no identification with USA
 Prejudices were expressed by all parties but also debunked.
 Ex. Colonization, rich countries,...

Different group roles in Uganda group: academic student, class leader, cooking,...
 Ramadan: recognition to everyone who participates

 (Let us know how we can support you?)
 Selfie time! Importance of pictures...
 Learning from each other in an open and respectful manner.



Theme: Migration/Globalisation

- Actual topic in USA: migration from Mexico, Asia, racism
- Actual topic in Uganda: migration from South Soudan: refugee camps, racism and discrimination are minor topics
 - Actual topic in Belgium: migration from different regions, migration crisis - Racism and diversity are actual topics
- Visit to Brussels (Migration museum, Matongé), Visit to Red Star Line Museum: personal link: students with migration roots, professors whose grand-mother or great grand parents took the red star line from Belgium to Philadelphia



"To see that culture is a resource, it's not about focusing on how the Europeans do their things, the Americans, the Africans. But can we see it on a point that, OK, much as we do things differently, but how can we gain? How can we be? How can it be beneficial to us?
